The Gemini Effect is all about Energy

Local band The Gemini Effect (TGE) recently played at Browns Bay Brewing Company, warming up for the release of their third album later this year.

"Raw power trio rock energy arriving by spaceship" is how musician and songwriter Rob Sharp describes TGE. To hear them, you'd think the "E" in TGE stands for energy, the word punctuates everything about the band. It takes energy to "rise above", "to give your all", to "push what we do" Rob said; to vocalise the issues they're energetic about, to get the (Gemini) effect they're after. That is, if a song doesn't shift the listener's emotional state, then it doesn't work – it's not "ON" like the psychedelic lit symbol on Rob's t-shirt.

Making up the band with Rob are John Blackburn on bass and Ben Farrant on drums. John too is a local, and like Rob he grew up and developed his musical skills in the UK. John brings a professional edge to the band having played for Skin (Skunk Anasie) and toured with Joe Strummer, amongst others. Ben provides the thunder behind the drum kit to drive the Gemini sound.

TGE range across genres such as psychedelic rock, punk, dub reggae, garage rock and 90's grunge. "I gravitate towards artists that have passion and energy" Rob explained. One can hear the influence of Strummer, Jack White and Sublime, tinged with traces of space rock pioneers Hawkwind. There are also hints of Levellers-type folk rock protest songs. In Rob's words, "light and shade; contrast". Like new song Idea informed by people going down internet rabbit holes. There are fun songs, like Gridlock Party (the music video was filmed overlooking Long Bay), 'take no prisoners' songs like Tear Down as well as songs about serious terrors like Guns. A new song Defiance was triggered by Rob's anger about forced migration across Europe due the war in Ukraine.

One of Rob's philosophies is "there are three things you can give people – your time, your energy and your love." Unfortunately for musicians these days, they're expected to give away their music for free despite the immense time and energy they put in. So, in the spirit of supporting local, go and see them live, check out www.thegeminieffect.com, buy some merch or a CD of their albums -(Atomic Blues and Bad Alien). Follow

them on Facebook for news of their next album *Hotwire Babylon.* Watch the skies!

Lieutenant William Avery Bourke RNZNVR 1940-1946; Prisoner of War, Palembang, Sumatra 1942-1945

Earlier this year, Long Bay resident Penny Oakley asked me if it was possible to restore a drawing of her father who was a Japanese prisoner of war, captured in 1942 following the fall of Singapore. The picture was on flimsy paper and drawn in charcoal, the only medium available to the prisoners. So emerged a story of survival in some of the worst surroundings imaginable.

During 1940 the call went out in New Zealand for volunteers. Bill Bourke, keen rugby player, sailor, and employee of Fletchers, signed on in August for the Royal Navy Volunteer Reserve (New Zealand Division). He, with 19 other candidates, left for England and the Royal Navy. Bill, along with three other candidates (including his good friend, Bob Arkley, who survived the Japanese prisoner of war camps with him), were drafted to HMS *Electra*, an 'E' Class Destroyer. During the early months of 1941 they were involved in North Sea and Atlantic patrols, eventually leaving the ship not long before she was involved in the hunt for the *Bismarck*. Bill (along with Bob) was then commissioned as an officer and applied for a posting nearer home. In December 1941 he received orders to join HMS Sultan, the Singapore Naval Base, arriving there shortly after Japan entered the war.



On arrival in Singapore, Bill and his friend Bob and their respective crews were posted to the Royal Navy Barracks. The men were only there for three days before the Barracks were evacuated. Bill's vessel, a partially commissioned armed motor launch (ML432), was

involved in many naval actions and the rescue and evacuation of troops and civilians following the landing of Japanese troops on Singapore Island on the night of 8/9 February 1942. The fighting which followed lasted until 15 February when Singapore finally fell. Bill's launch was badly damaged by enemy fire. He was subsequently captured and interned as a Japanese P.O.W.—first on Banka Island, and then in various camps near Palembang, Sumatra.

Bill was originally posted as missing on 13 February 1942 and it wasn't until late 1943 that his family learnt that he had been captured. It wasn't reported until a month after the Japanese surrender in August 1945, that both Bill and Bob were alive. During those years of captivity, the prisoners were subject to dreadful conditions, especially as the Japanese themselves considered surrender to be dishonourable. As a result, they held allied prisoners in contempt and treated them harshly.

Eleven New Zealanders were held in the Palembang camps from the Navy and Bill was one of the officers in charge of working parties. As time went on, 700 men became jammed into the insufficient space of the bug-ridden Cheung Hwa camp. Rations were reduced, there was no private cooking, no working parties, and no pay.

Almost every meal involved rice. Conditions at Bill and Bob's last camp, Sungei Geron, were primitive. There was no electricity, no running water and disgusting latrines. At night, men used small oil lamps to read. By 1 July 1944, the camp strength was over 1,000.

Most were suffering from two or more conditions including dysentery, malaria, dengue, Beriberi, pellagra, scabies, ulcers, serious malnutrition and many more ailments. The Japanese erected a punishment cage that was in constant use. Following an assault, one British prisoner was found guilty and executed. Prisoners were reduced to eating maggots from the latrine trenches, cats, dogs, snakes, lizards, frogs and iguana. This diet is unsurprising as, by 1945, one of the men who survived the camps, David Roberts, noted that the prisoners were only getting "about one third of a cupful of uncooked rice per day, and very little else". The average weight of the men in the camp had dropped to 45 kgs and in the main camp a quarter of the prisoners died between May and August 1945.

Following Japan's surrender on 15 August 1945, Bill left Sungei Geron for his repatriation via Australia to New Zealand. By the time he returned, he had been overseas for five years. His skill as an artist did not go un-noticed. During his internment, using materials such as charcoal and scraps of



paper, he and his compatriots recorded daily life in the camps.

Bill returned to his career with Fletcher Holdings and became Chairman of Fletcher Construction in 1968. He died in 1984 at the age of 68 and was survived by his wife, Bobbie, son Bill, and daughter Penny.

My thanks to Bill's family and especially James McMillan who provided essential information. All for Peace Concert for ANZAC Day



Out of the Mouths of Babes

"The cars are going too fast!"

Traffic using Deep Creek Road has increased apace with the increase in homes in Torbay and Long Bay. Now, with Glenvar Road traffic detoured to Deep Creek, Glenvar and Carlisle Roads the risk to pedestrians crossing the road have increased.

Annie Forbes, Head Teacher at Torbay Kindergarten at 141 Deep Creek Road has become increasingly concerned about the safety of the kindergarten's children and their parents. She has witnessed crashes, wing mirrors being and someone's car door taken off.

"It's become very unsafe for pedestrians and cars parking. The only crossing island (east of the kindergarten) is no longer fit for purpose. It is too small for a parent with a toddler in a stroller and their kindergarten-age child walking beside them," she said. "At the start of every kindergarten session, cars toot their horns, slam on their brakes, yell at the cars trying to inch out of the car spaces – there is no visibility."

In the playground, 4 year olds watching the cars speeding down the road are heard to say "we need traffic lights to stop them", "we need a zebra crossing to help people walk through the road".

Auckland Transport needs to investigate Annie's fears and suggested solutions urgently. These are: a raised zebra crossing and a raised red 'slow' sign painted on the road in both directions at this point on Deep Creek Rd; and the school speed limit applied to roads outside kindergartens. Making the Glenvar Road repair a priority would also help.

Another View on Sediment

The Friends of Okura Bush and Long Bay-Okura Great Park Society have their focus and I respect that their best wishes are directed towards the preservation and care of the area. However, developers do not deserve sole blame for the sediment pictured in your March issue. There are other sources of the sediment that ends up in Okura River that deserves a mention.

Numerous streams run into Okura River from the native bush, forests, farmland and the Okura village. Now, as always, the running water erodes the stream beds down to the clay or sandstone base of those streambeds, resulting in soluble clay ending up in the river.

During a recent but not the biggest downpour, myself and others were kayaking in the Okura River beyond the pedestrian bridge to the Reserve and the river was already brownish. The water entering from the bush streams was markedly darkening the brown hue of the river.

The deluge of rain in January was massive, more than most of us have witnessed in our lifetimes. The many landslips from the riverbanks and surrounding bush areas also exposed and moved soluble clay into the river and surrounding sea with the outgoing tides.

Gardening with Veronika

Mid-autumn is here with its crisper cooler weather. This provides an opportunity to get seeds and seedlings in before winter when there is still

enough daylight, and the soil temperatures are warm. Add organic matter like compost and aged manure and work into the soil before planting seedlings.

Directly sow in the garden: lettuce, coriander, rocket, corn salad, miners' lettuce, mizuna, broad beans, peas, parsnip, radish, spinach, pak choy, carrots, and beetroot.



Plant seedlings of: cauliflowers, broccoli, kale, silverbeet, perpetual spinach, lettuces and parsley.

Plant enough leafy greens to take you through the winter months and sow batches of peas, beetroot, rocket, corn salad, mizuna, lettuce and coriander every 3 – 4 weeks to ensure a continuous supply.

If you have any gaps between your veggies after planting, fill them by planting a green crop. Green crops are also known as cover crops or manure crops and are grown for the nutrients and organic matter that they give back to the soil. They will enrich your soil, provide you with free mulch and

Autumn is also a good time to be planting trees and shrubs as the soils are still warm, and they can establish over the wet winter months to follow.

PERPETUAL SPINACH—If you like spinach but find it tricky to grow, and that it often bolts before you get much out of it, try Perpetual spinach. Perpetual spinach which is a type of chard is very similar in flavour to spinach. It is however a hardy plant and easier to grow than true spinach. It grows well over the cooler months and can still tolerate the hotter weather and longer days over summer. It has softer leaves then silverbeet and a mild flavor and can be eaten both fresh in a salad or cooked. Such a great veg to grow and use in a variety of food.

Opportunity to Garden with Guidance

If you'd like to grow your own organic vegetables but you haven't got the space or you wouldn't know where to start, the friendly St Mary's by the Sea Church Community Garden group might be the solution. They have 3–4 allotments ready for new members who want to develop or exercise their green fingers.

The plots are suitable for herbs, vegetables, or flowers. You choose and source your own seeds or seedlings, but the existing gardeners often have spares to get you started. They're a sharing bunch – excess produce is put into the Sharing Shed on Deep Creek Road. They're also happy to share their gardening knowledge, so it's a great way to learn how and what to plant when.

Established in September 2020 behind the church at 168 Deep Creek Road, Torbay, the Community Garden team has worked steadily to establish and expand the garden. They have a mixture of knowledge and experience and range in





Fishing with Pont



By Nathan Pont

In the last two issues I discussed how to tie and how to use a ledger rig. This month I cover what fishing rod, reel and line should be used to catch snapper using a ledger rig.

There are two different types of reels which suit ledger rig fishing as follows:

OVERHEAD REEL, BOAT REEL—This reel is straight-forward and can be used for dropping the ledger rig straight down and reeling it up. I recommend getting a reel with a level wind as this ensures that the line is spread evenly when it is pulled up and you don't have to worry about spreading the line.

SPIN REEL—The spin reel is my favourite and one I have always found easier

Example of a spin reel with the baitrunner feature at the back of the reel to use. While a spin reel can also go straight up and down, it is also easily cast. While casting isn't required for ledger rig fishing it is very handy for other forms of fishing such as stray lining. One feature to look out for in a spin reel is a bait feeder/bait runner feature which is useful for stray lining

ROD—A common weight rod is 10-15kg. If you're using an overhead reel ensure that you're using an overhead rod and vice versa for spin as the rods are designed for the eyes to be on top on the overhead and bottom for a spin. A quick way of telling the rods apart is to read the description on the rod. Spin reels have larger eyes closer to the butt which get smaller, whereas an overhead reel has the same size eyes.

LINE—For ledger rig fishing a 12kg nylon is adequate as they aren't commonly used directly over a reef. However, if the line is upgraded to 15kg this gives the flexibility of also being able to strayline with the fishing rod and reel. Most of the

fishing in the East Coast Bays is under 30m. This means that it is possible to stay in touch with the bait (feel the bites). If you are fishing above 30m I'd recommend using braid.





Awaruku Predator Control Project

Restore Hibiscus and Bays is setting up an ambitious backyard predator control project to provide protection to Significant Ecological Areas (SEAs) located throughout the Awaruku catchment area (boundary shown in yellow on map). This involves placing bait stations and traps on private property at regular intervals to complement the predator control already ongoing in parks and reserves. Predator control is essential to protect this precious habitat for endangered native species of birds, lizards and insects.



The RHB team have been engaging

22

with residents in and around the SEA areas (shown in green on the map) to get their consent to place bait stations and traps on their properties. The traps and bait stations will be serviced by local volunteers.

RHB are looking for more volunteers who can spend up to an hour once a week, four times a month in February, April, August and November. Or up to an hour, on two consecutive days, twice a year (February and August) to carry out predator monitoring in some reserves in the Awaruku area.

Full training and all equipment would be provided, plus ongoing support, and you would be making a real difference for nature.

Life on the Edge April 2023 Ngā Kōrero

Meet the Sea Stars—Cetaceans

Some of the most enigmatic species we can spot from the shore belong to an infraorder of aquatic mammals—cetacea. It includes bottlenose dolphins and orca. As well as common dolphins, Brydes, humpback, southern right and various beaked whales can be encountered throughout *Tikapa Moana Te Moananui ā Toi*/the Hauraki Gulf.

These animals tell us lots about the health of our environment. During 'Seaweek', MERC hosted a public seminar supported by the NZ National Commission for UNESCO. Guest speaker Professor Karen Stockin from Massey University shared findings of cutting-edge research that gives insight into the prevalence of environmental contaminants in NZ marine mammals.

Cetaceans are exposed to contaminants which enter the ocean directly, and indirectly, through waterways and air.



By examining the tissues of these wide-ranging mammals, the impacts of contaminants are revealed over time. Even though using DDTs (dichloro-diphenyl-trichloroethane, a synthetic insecticide) was banned in 1989, it is still being detected in marine mammals in *Aotearoa*, indicating that DDT is still present in our environment.

For the sake of marine mammals and ourselves, we need to be mindful that our decisions can impact our environment for decades.
