Summer House Maintenance

Around the home, the holiday season tends to be about aesthetics - a clean house, deck, garden and lawns. We may let more functional maintenance slip by. A couple of less thought-of tasks are up a bit higher – "sky-high" – in the sense of rain and sun, or more specifically clear guttering and clean solar panels. It's not just autumn leaves that block your gutters. Grass and plants can take-off in the watery haven of house spouting and tile grit from most concrete-tiled roof sheds over time, creating a nice bed for fuzzy green moss and all sorts of greenery that you may be completely unaware of. There's plenty of rain this summer to spark this growth.

So, don't forget to look up and act on those old words of wisdom "an ounce of prevention is better than a pound of cure".

Have solar? Over time, dust, lichen, and bird poop grind away at your solar panel's efficiency. Whoever is taking care of your gutter clean is in a great position to give your panels a clean-up too. Did you know that the recommended solution for cleaning panels is just a weak mixture of water and dish-washing detergent? But, to avoid causing a performance issue called PID due to cold water on hot panels, it's best to clean panels away from the burning summer sun: so early or later in the day is best.

The big challenge is access - how to get access to your guttering and solar panels. We've come across two cases recently where "simple" single-storey ladder access off a deck led to the ladder sliding out beneath the intrepid homeowners. Bank Scams - How to Prevent Them

The increase in bank scams has been in the news recently. If you were away over the holiday period, you might have missed the reporting on how Maria of La Bella Vita Beauty Therapy, in Torbay Village was robbed of \$30,000 just before Christmas! To help others not fall victim

to such scams, Maria went public.

In an interview with Newshub, Maria explained that she received a phone call from someone claiming to be from Westpac Bank's fraud team. They said there had been some suspicious activity on her account. "They knew all of the correct things to say," Maria said. They appeared sympathetic. "I'm really sorry this has happened to you... let's

Tell-tale Signs

Tell-tale signs you're being called by a scammer from Netsafe:

- You're contacted out of the blue are you expecting a call from your bank or internet provider? Do they have a reason to be contacting you?
- They ask for passwords. NEVER give anyone your password real providers do not need your passwords.
- They want you to pay them via an uncommon payment method.
 Scammers often ask for payment unconventionally, for example through preloaded debit cards and gift cards, such as Apple iTunes cards.
- You feel pressured to make a quick decision. Scammers could threaten you with the closure of your bank account or IRD fines if you don't act quickly.

Check netsafe.org.nz regularly for the updates and information on the latest scams.

get on top of this" the scammer said to her.

Feeling there was a need to act urgently, Maria provided the information she was asked for. The information enabled the scammers to empty her accounts. In total they stole about \$30,000. When Maria found the money gone, she felt violated, shame and just heartbroken.

To make matters worse, Westpac said that it could take them up to a month to investigate. In the meantime, Maria still had staff and bills to pay.



If a number calling you is suspicious, hang up and then call the institution on the number on its website. If there is a legitimate problem, they will be able to see it, and if there is not one, you will know you didn't give any information to the scammer.

Most companies will also have a publicly available list of numbers that they will call you from. Create a contact for all of these and if you receive a call from a number that is not one of these, then treat it as suspicious and follow the steps above.



Gardening with Veronika

February can be a tough month in the garden. Keeping up with watering can be challenging and it can be easy to feel disheartened if it's dry and hot for weeks on end. It can help to start your veggies in trays indoors to control the moisture and your seedlings should be ready to be planted out when the cooler weather arrives and temperature drops slightly. If it's roasting hot and dry you can delay planting carrots and winter brassicas.

Tips for Growing Healthy Carrots

- Carrots don't like their roots disturbed and are best grown from seeds. Plant seeds in full sun and make sure seeds are kept moist during germination. This can be done by adding a layer of mulch, a piece of hessian cloth or some cardboard to lock in the moisture until your seeds have germinated. After germination add some type of bird netting to stop birds scratching up your precious seeds. Water daily if the weather is dry to prevent seedlings from drying out.
- Carrots need free draining and well dug soil to thrive. If the soil is too hard or lumpy you might end up with carrots that are short or bent. Prepare your bed by loosening up the soil. Adding a bit of builder's sand to your garden bed allows carrot taproots (the actual carrots) to grow straight down and grow thicker without any pressure or resistance limiting their growth.
- Carrots grow well in sandy soil and soil that is not too rich in nitrogen. If the soil is too high in nitrogen you might end up with more leaves than root.
- Liquid seaweed is a good feed for carrots during the growing season.

If you have an empty space in the garden, try planting a green crop to prepare your beds for your winter crops. Nitrogen fixing lupins will not only draw nitrogen into the soil, but the plant will make an excellent mulch if chopped down at root level and left on the soil. This will give the best start to your winter crops such as your brassicas that love a nitrogen rich soil.

If powdery mildew is plentiful on your plants, try spraying your cucurbits with a milk spray of 30% milk:70% water. Remove any effected leaves and spray the rest of the plant with the mixture weekly.

Enjoy the sunshine and hopefully some tasty veggies come out of your garden this month. Happy Gardening

Quick Deck Make-Over

If your deck has almost had it but you can't afford to replace it, you could get another year or two out of it by giving it a slap of paint.

- Clear the deck. Using a soft broom, broom on 30 Second Outdoor Cleaner mixed with water as per pack instructions.
- If there's a build-up of gunk, use a Scrub Deck Bulldozer with Scraper to brush all the boards. Hose off.
- Next day, or when dry, use a paint roller on a long pole to

paint the deck. If you don't care about the colour, check the mistint bin at Mitre 10 or any paint store for bargains.

Depending on how many more winters you think your deck will last, and your budget, you can give it a second coat. We already had a soft broom, bucket and painter's extension handle and we only did one coat. How much paint you need depends on the size of your deck. Here's how much this cost to transform our cruddy worn-out deck over two days in time for our New Year's Eve BBQ:

Lamb Kofta Meatballs & Spaghetti Recipe

Low-cost, quick and easy meal for 4 people.

With long summer days it's easy to get carried away outside or working longer to clear your Christmas-break backlog. Here's an easy, tasty, quick-to-prepare meal if you've left making dinner too late.

This recipe uses the Torbay Village Butchery's Lamb Koftas. They happen to be gluten-free and are mildly spicy.

Ingredients

- Lamb Kofta skewers x 5
- 1 onion diced
- 2-3 finely chopped cloves of garlic
- 1 tbsp dried Italian herbs
- 1 can chopped tomatoes
- 2-3 tbsp tomato paste
- 1/3 can of water
- Salt & pepper to taste

Lightly fry the chopped onion and garlic in olive oil. Sweat down, remove and cover in tin foil. Mark the skewered meat to equal 5 meatballs per skewer, or smaller if you want. Lightly wet hands before removing meatball portions from skewer & roll into balls. Fry meatballs in a deep pan until browned on two sides. Add the onion, garlic, tomatoes,

pad into the water. Now I jump at the opportunity to fish every weather window we get.

I'm going to start off giving you tips and tricks on how to target different species of fish using different techniques, starting with snapper. But do let me know what boat fishing topics you'd like covered in future issues. You can email me via theteam@torbay.co.nz

Form of Fishing: Ledger Rig

Knots and Rigs: A majority of people have used a fishing rig in a range of forms consisting of nylon, a lead sinker and a hook.

Dropper, Ledger, Flasher Rig: This is the most common rig. It's a fantastic rig to use when first starting out as they can be purchased premade or can easily be made at home (see diagram). With premade ledger rigs all you need to do is tie a uni knot (see image) to tie the swivel to the main line and the rig to a sinker at the bottom.

Next month I'll go over where to find snapper and how to use a ledger rig to catch them.



Concerns Flagged for New Hibiscus & Bays Board

The top concern locals would like the new Hibiscus & Local Bays Board to focus on is improving infrastructure to reduce sewage run-off into the sea at our beaches. The Christmas holidays is peak season for our beaches and, as if on cue, Waiake and Long Bay were issued with a black flag alert on New Year's Day. That's not the sort of national news we want to be known for.

Other top concerns identified in our survey of readers were: monitoring building and other sites that create sedimentation run-off to the beaches and marine reserve, and related to this participants wanted harsher penalties when sites cause this to happen. Restoration and preservation of natural habitats, for example via pest control, was rated third, with improving the reliability and frequency of public transport in the Bays close behind, followed by concerns for the security and safety of the shops in our local centres.

Over 60 people, aged mostly between 25 and 64 participated in the survey. About 60% lived in Torbay and there was a good spread of longer-term residents and people newer to our area. A majority of people wrote extra comments highlighting priorities they'd like to see the HBLB address. The long-standing broken promise to make the Glenvar/East Coast Road intersection safer was mentioned often. One person said, "we have lived here for over 50 years and have been promised that Glenvar Road would be properly upgraded and finished. It is a disgrace that this is still not a



priority."

Thank you to everyone who took part. We'll pass on the anonymised results to the HBLB and congratulations to the winner of the \$100 voucher.

Meet the Shark - Mangō

Happy New Year e te whānau!

There are 72 known species of sharks worldwide. Collectively known as "mangō" in te reo Māori, regional dialects mean there are a range of Māori words used for different species. The species we are most likely to see in Tikapa Moana Te Moananui ā Toi/the Hauraki Gulf are kapetā/tupere/(school), kakere/mangōpare (hammerhead), taha pounamu/mangō pounamu (blue), mako (mako), matawhā/ngengero (bronze whaler) and mangō ripi (thresher).

Like most animals, the presence of their favourite prey usually determines where sharks can be found. In summer as small fish head closer to shore, the sharks follow them in. Summer is also when most people spend more time in the water meaning we both turn up to the beach at the same time, increasing the opportunities to see sharks. During



summer on a clear calm day, you might be lucky enough to see a fin breaking the surface of the water. These are usually small pups basking on the surface or chasing small fish.

Each summer we are likely to see small sharks while we are out adventuring with the kids. You can always tell which ones saw them as they beam with excitement when sharing their story back at MERC.

Christmas Wreath Workshop

We suggest:

Make a Valentine's Day Card

You will need:

- 1 sheet A4 pink card
- 1 piece white card 9.5cm x 13cm
- 1 piece blue card 4cm x 4cm
- 1 piece dark pink card
- Scrap card to make heart templates

Make heart templates by folding a piece of scrap card in half and draw half of a heart measuring 2cm at the centre and half a heart measuring 1cm at the centre. When opened out these will give two even heart shapes.

Cut A4 pink card in half to measure 21cm x 14cm. Fold the pink card to make a 10.5cm x 14cm card base.

Stick the white card onto the front of the pink card base. Cut a 4cm square from the blue card and stick a thin strip of white card in a cross on the front.



Cut out 2 large hearts and 2 small hearts from the dark pink card and 1 large heart and 2 small hearts from the pink card.

Stick blue card onto lower part of card front. Then arrange and stick the hearts on.

Use a black pen to draw the strings attaching the hearts to the blue box.

The club will be back dancing from


7 March on Tuesday nights 7.30 to 9.30pm at St Anne's Hall on the corner of Glencoe and Beach Roads.

Days to Celebrate in February

Waitangi Day - Monday 6 February



Waitangi Day commemorates the signing of *te Tiriti o* Waitangi, the Treaty signed in 1840 by British officials and the chiefs of various hapū. Hapū is a kin-based collective of whānau (families descended from a common ancestor). If you're Scottish, you could think of the word clan. Hapū in 1840, and all the whānau belonging to the hapū, collectively decided their own affairs.

Dame Anne Salmond, a distinguished Professor

of Anthropology at the University of Auckland, recently urged our country to relook at the original wording and promises of *te Tiriti o Waitangi*. She did this because some

reinterpretations of *te Tiriti* over the last 35 years, she believed had introduced some "destructive" ideas. One idea that has fuelled increasing division, she explains, was a 1987 legal judgement introducing the false interpretation that the Treaty documented a "partnership" between "*Pākehā* and *Māori*" or "the Crown and the *Māori* race". But this idea was not mentioned in either the English or the *Māori* language version of *te Tiriti*. It was not a "partnership between races". *Hapū* are not a 'race'. Nowadays, *hapū* may have family members with genealogy stretching around the world. The Crown is not a race, and neither does 'the Crown' exclude *Māori*. In fact, the current representative of the Sovereign in New Zealand, Her Excellency The Right Honorable Dame Cindy Kiro, appointed by the late Queen Elizabeth II, is a *Māori* woman.

Te Tiriti o Waitangi, Professor Salmond explains, set down the protections the $hap\bar{u}$ chiefs wanted from Queen Victoria (and her descendants forever) and what they exchanged in return for her promise "to look after all the indigenous inhabitants of New Zealand". But the Treaty was not just about protecting *Māori*. Article 3 of the Treaty promised "justice and equality in human dignity and everyday living" for **all** citizens of New Zealand. All citizens, then and to come, were guaranteed "cultural equality".

Rulers and politicians throughout time have often sought to erase or rewrite history to suit their own agendas. They also use the ol' divide and conquer strategy, deliberately encouraging an "us" versus "them" mentality. Professor Salmond's paper* is a good reminder to be wary of attempts to pit us one against the other. This Waitangi Day celebrate things we have in common: that the care of our *whānau* / family is central; the diversity in your and others' *whakapapa* / genealogy; and, the concept of our descendance from, or dependency on, *Papatūānuku* (the Earth Mother) and *Ranginui* (the Sky Father). As *Māori* can be heard to say, if you go back far enough, we're all related.

*Professor Salmond's paper 'Where will the Bellbird sing? Te Tiriti o Waitangi and Race' was published in Policy Quarterly, Volume 18, Issue 4 in November 2022.

The origins of Valentine's Day are contested and subsequently not all religions countenance it. For many,

Pet Cats Caught in Ōkura/Stillwater Biodiversity Hot Spots

Adapted from a longer Friends of Ōkura Bush article by Joanna Crawford & Bernard Michaux

Between January and October last year, 15 cats were caught in live-catch traps on or beside Biodiversity Focus Areas including Karepiro Beach and the globally rare Cheneir formation at Stillwater. These areas are ecologically significant and need intensive management to protect their indigenous ecosystems and the species dependent on them.

Cats represent a serious risk to a number of endemic species and migratory wading birds. Any delay in managing the presence of cats in sensitive areas will stop any chances of birds breeding again this season or in years to come. Shockingly, Auckland Council has advised that it has neither





Birds at Risk

- Pāteke/Brown Teal (small brown ducks usually only found behind predator-proof fences or offshore island sanctuaries);
- The secretive banded rail or moho pererū;
- Kūaka/bar-tailed godwit (in the summer);
- *Tōrea*/pied oystercatcher (in the winter);
- Tūturiwhatu ;
- Poaka/pied stilts;
- Kōtuku ngutupapa or Royal Spoonbill.

Cats also kill insects including our wētā, tuna/eels, koura/native crayfish, and native lizards.

the resources or capacity to trap cats in these precious areas! They said they are relying on responsible cat ownership to prevent further loss of native species on the Ōkura to Stillwater foreshore.

Seven of the trapped cats were domestic pets. One of them was caught on two separate occasions. Microchip registration and posts on social media posts enabled six of these cats to be returned to their owners, most of whom were oblivious to the nocturnal damage their cat was causing. The distance these cats were travelling was at least 2km and up to 4kms one way. But they can roam much further. *Manaaki Whenua* - Landcare Research tracked one cat that ranged over 23kms.

- Recognise that cats are predators;
- Have your cat de-sexed and microchipped;
- Register your cat (whether microchipped or not);
- Add bells to your cat's collar ;
- Keep your cat inside between dusk and dawn at an absolute minimum;
- Consider adding an outdoor cat enclosure to your house to stop your cat leaving your property;
- Support responsible cat ownership to be legalized;
- Donate to Friends of Ōkura Bush to help fund their pest control work.






Keeping Children Safe Around Dogs

- As lovable as dogs are, they're still animals and they can be unpredictable.
- Always stay with children when there's a dog around, especially children who are visiting.
- Never leave children alone with a dog, even to answer the door or to go to the toilet.
- If you tie your dog up in a public place, consider using a muzzle.
- Never tie a dog leash to the baby's pram; hold the leash in your hand.
- Dogs should have their own toys. If a dog has taken your child's toy, and the child tries to get their toy back from the dog, the dog may bite them.

TEACH YOUR CHILD:

- not all dogs are as friendly as their own dog;
- be calm around dogs;
- ask the owner's permission before patting a dog;
- why dogs behave the way they do, and how they might be protecting their property or their family;
- not to tease or annoy dogs;
- not to approach a dog that's eating, sleeping, has puppies, or is hurt;
- not to hug or kiss dogs. Face-to-face contact is a common cause of bites to the face.



Glamorgan School Celebrates its 50th Jubilee



We are a group of year 5 ESOL students from Glamorgan School. For our school's 50th Jubilee we decided that our school needed a new flagpole. The old one had become unsafe and had been removed.

We put together a complete proposal which included the history of the original flagpole, options and quotes for a new one

and suggestions for its new location which we then presented to the Board of Trustees. We then made 200 beaded keychains which we sold to the other children to raise the money to pay for the flagpole.

While doing our research we discovered that in 1979 one of Glamorgan's foundation teachers, Mrs Templeton, had returned to her previous school in Wales and was given a genuine Welsh flag to bring back to our school. Glamorgan Drive and our school had been named by a Welshman who farmed in the area prior to the school being built. Our school had adopted the Welsh dragon as its emblem. Our deputy principal at the time, Kate Howarth, died in the crash. When Mrs Templeton arrived back in New Zealand and the Welsh flag was finally raised up the flagpole, it had to be flown at half-mast.

We wondered, if once again, the school in Wales might be interested in sending us another flag, so we wrote them a letter. They have replied saying they will. We're hoping that when it comes we'll be able to raise the flag to the top of our new flagpole for a really happy occasion, Glamorgan School's 50th Jubilee.


